Since many of Finn's nursery school friends have younger brothers and sisters, we had a hunch he'd feel comfortable with the idea of a sibling. Furthermore, while playing with his favorite doll D.W., he would often tell us, "I want a REAL baby. Let's buy one."

Last October, while the baby was busy kicking inside mommy, Finn got a big kick out of talking to his sister-to-be. He'd ask Ellen to open her mouth wide, and then yell inside it, "Hello, Baby Girl down there!" In November, our daughter Olivia was born, about a month ahead of schedule. Gratefully, both mom and baby are doing well. From the first day Finn met Olivia, he treated her with tenderness. He enjoys giving her gentle kisses, rubbing his cheek against hers, and sweetly saying, "I love you, Baby Girl!"


