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FREE BABYSITTING & OTHER PERKS

Grandparents bring out the best in their grandchildren -- and vice versa! Whenever Finn and Olivia (ages 6 and 2) spend time with Gram and Pop (my wife Ellen's parents) or hang out with Bubbie and Zaidie (my parents), everyone becomes a kid again. Whether they are playing hide-and-seek, blowing bubbles, or watering the garden together, "grandparent time" offers a delightful mixture of laughter, learning, and unabashed spoiling. ("Here! Have another cookie!") Watching the bond grow between our children and their grandparents is one of the most delightful aspects of being a parent.

And... let's not forget the perks! Did I mention FREE babysitting? When the grandparents babysit for Finn and Olivia, it's a wonderful win-win situation for everyone. Ellen and I might get the chance to see a movie in an actual movie theater, or perhaps share a meal out without being interrupted with cries of "Mommy! Olivia got into the markers!" or "Daddy! Satchmo peed on the rug!" (Lucky for us, grandparents love to babysit for pets, too!) Meanwhile, the kids get to show off their latest skills ("Check this out, Gram, a backwards somersault!" "Hey, Bubbie, wanna see me do ballet?"), or have fun exploring the grandparents' stuff. Olivia loves playing "dress up" with her grandmothers' jewelry and clothes.

One of Finn's favorite places in the world is Pop's Shed. This small wooden backyard shed is loaded with tools and other odds-and-ends. That Finn loves this spot is no wonder, considering his mechanical inclination began in toddlerhood. No one will be surprised if Finn becomes an engineer or inventor when he grows up. Whatever the future may hold, Pop is always eager to let Finn explore this shed, and encourages him take home treasures such as an assortment of nuts and bolts, or a retractable tape measure.

Grandparents also have the amazing superpower of Mega-Patience. When Finn and Olivia behave rambunctiously, and do the sorts of things that might drive Ellen and me up the walls, their grandparents instinctively figure out ways to defuse the mayhem WITHOUT resorting to time-outs, taking away privileges, or screaming (the triumvirate of tactics too often used by frazzled parents, like me.) My mother has a real knack for coming up with creative distractions. When all else fails, I can always count on my parents to regale Finn and Olivia with embarrassing stories from my childhood. ("Zaidie, tell me the story about Daddy throwing up on his first day of school!")

CELEBRATING NATIONAL GRANDPARENTS DAY (SEPT 9)

Many National holidays strike me as ridiculous. Do we really need Penguin Awareness Day? What's up with National Dance Like a Chicken Day? And, someone clearly had too much time on his hands when he founded National Bubble Wrap Appreciation Day. But, one holiday that definitely deserves more fanfare is National Grandparents Day, which falls on September 9th this year. It's a pity more people don't even know this holiday exists. This day presents a wonderful opportunity to honor these important family members. Here are some activities you might try in your home.

CREATE "I LOVE YOU" CARDS -- Children who are fortunate enough to have living grandparents can make and send their grandparents a special card to celebrate this day. The project doesn't have to be time consuming. My kids whip up simple finger paintings that have nearly caused their grandparents to swoon. While it is possible for kids to send an email to their grandparents on this special day, lotech cards are often the most meaningful. If your children don't have living grandparents, they can celebrate this holiday by sending a homemade card to another older relative, or even an elderly friend. Growing up, I had a number of "honorary grandparents"--senior citizens in our neighborhood who were wonderful family friends.

USE PHOTOS TO SPARK STORIES -- To commemorate National Grandparents Day, I plan to dig out some old pictures of Gram, Pop, Bubbie, and Zaidie. My children marvel when they see what their grandparents looked like as children. When Finn and Olivia want me to tell a story about when I was growing up, I'm often stumped. However, when I open family photo albums, the stories just flow and flow.

MAKE A PHOTO FAMILY TREE -- A more organized photo activity that helps children learn about their family's history is creating a photographic family tree. Start with your child (or children) at the trunk, and expand upward to include the names and pictures of parents, grandparents etc. As you work on the family tree, share stories about great-grandparents and other relatives that are no longer alive. It might even spark an interest in genealogy, and encourage your family to get in touch with long-distance relatives. (See the link at the right for further instructions on this activity.)

BAKE A FAMILY RECIPE -- When I was growing up, it was always a treat to cook with my grandmothers. My Grandma Eleanor used to make amazing lasagna and chocolate chip meringue cookies, while my Grandma Ruth's specialties were matzo balls and rugelach cookies. Anytime I make these dishes in our kitchen for Finn and Olivia, I feel a

special connection to the past. If your children's grandparents live far away, perhaps part of your celebration might be baking something sweet and mailing it to them.

STAYING IN TOUCH ACROSS THE MILES

We live just a couple hours from Ellen's parents, so fortunately Finn and Olivia are able to visit with them often. However, since my folks live much further way, staying in touch often requires some creativity and technology. During car trips, for example, when my children start to get antsy, one source of distraction is letting them use my cell phone to call long-distance relatives. (Fortunately, I have a flat-rate billing plan, so I don't worry about the cost when Finn goes into incredible detail about his plan to build an inter-galactic spaceship.)

About a month ago, my tech-savvy dad figured out a new way for Finn and Olivia to communicate with himself and my mother. My parents sent us a small, inexpensive webcam (short for "web camera") that we can use to have live "video phone calls." So far, most of these webcam experiences have involved Finn getting very close to the camera and saying, "Check out THIS silly face, Zaidie!" However, I suspect that during the school year, it will be a nice way for my children to share projects they are working on, and see their grandparents' smiling faces on a frequent basis. Finn and Olivia only use the webcam with Ellen or I present as there are, unfortunately, dangers lurking online.
